
INTERNAL REVIEW OF DISPROPORTIONALITY IN STUDENT DISCIPLINE

<u>Discipline – Intervention Rates</u>

Intervention rate indicates the percent of students who experience a particular disciplinary intervention over the course of a year. In 2017, for instance, the statewide rate of exclusions for all students was 3.5%, meaning between 3 and 4 students out of every 100 experienced exclusionary discipline. VPS's overall intervention rate (for exclusions) declined from 7.1% in 2013 to 5.4% in 2017. The chart below shows the intervention rate of the state's largest districts.

Exclusion rates in VPS have dropped for all individual subgroups from 2013 to 2017. For example, the exclusion rate for Black/African-American students dropped by 40% from 17.7% in 2013 to 10.5% in 2017. However, VPS rates remain above the statewide rates.

<u>Discipline – Composition Index</u>

The "Composition Index," on the other hand, illustrates the degree to which a specific student group is overrepresented or underrepresented relative to their proportion of the whole student body. All other things being equal, the composition index should be 1.0 or perfectly proportional.

The two charts below report the disproportionality in exclusionary discipline experienced by students identifying as Black/African American and students with disabilities among the largest Washington school districts (2016-17 school year). In both cases, VPS rates show disproportionality but are lower than the statewide rate.

- Black/African American students enrolled in Washington schools in 2017 were 2.11 times more likely to experience exclusionary discipline; Black/African American students enrolled in VPS were 1.92 times more likely to experience exclusionary discipline.
- Students with disabilities enrolled in Washington schools in 2017 were 2.01 times more likely to experience exclusionary discipline; students with disabilities enrolled in VPS classrooms were 1.58 times more likely to experience exclusionary discipline.
