



# School Performance Report

## Fruit Valley Elementary School

2015

Under the No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB), schools and districts that receive federal funds must demonstrate Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP), towards the goal of 100 percent of students meeting state standards by 2014 or be subject to various sanctions.

During the 2015-16 year, Washington State received a waiver that excludes the results of Smarter Balanced Assessment, the new state assessment in determining Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP), for this school year. Three other measurements were used to meet the federal mandate.

1. The rate of unexcused absences for students in grades 1-8
2. The graduation rate for high school students, and
3. Participation rate of 95%

### School Improvement

Teachers and parents work together to make sure Fruit Valley students are successful at school. They create a School Improvement Plan each year to identify and describe specific actions Fruit Valley is taking to improve student achievement. Parents are encouraged to contact the school to see Fruit Valley's School Improvement Plan.

The Tier I Team meets three times a year to monitor and discuss delivery of core curriculum and students' progress. Fruit Valley also uses Student Learning Plans to gauge the progress of each student.

### Our Highly Qualified Staff

The Elementary Secondary Education Act (ESEA) Law requires that all teachers who teach core academic subjects be highly qualified. Full certification, a bachelor's degree, and demonstrated competence in subject knowledge and teaching are required to be highly qualified. In 2014-15, 100% of Fruit Valley teachers met or exceeded these standards, and they continue to improve their knowledge and skills with ongoing professional training.
